Diane Beck, Mobility Manager with SPAN Inc., had a PowerPoint presentation\* for Council and residents how SPAN/Meals on Wheels help and service Denton County. Ms. Beck explained due to CARES Act funding, they will not be asking for a match in the cost of service.

Motion Parsons, second Schoenrade to approve a contract with SPAN beginning October 1, 2022, contingent on approval from the Town Attorney and the Town is provided monthly reports.

IV. Mayor, Council Members and Staff reports:

2. Mayor and Council-Council Member Hillyer complimented the DOPD on the “Coffee with a Cop” event. Town Secretary was asked to post the Council Liaison Appointment list on the website.

3. Public Works - Code Enforcement – Animal Control-None

4. Administration – None

5. Public Safety – Assistant Police Chief Gaines reported the department is still down two officers and continuing with the salary survey. Fire Chief Whisenhunt said the annual Fourth of July parade and picnic route is posted on their website as well as the town’s.

6. Road and Drainage Committee – Mayor Beougher reported on the progress of the Waketon project and concrete pour should start any day. Hopefully, will have the north side opened by the start of school. Mayor Beougher also commented on the Double Oaks Drive project. He said there were some failures and the contractor tried to fog seal the road, but the process failed. Contractor has provided a 2-year maintenance bond. The work on Meadow Knoll is complete. SLFRF money was used for the Double Oaks Drive culverts. The town’s engineer is working on future road repairs. Mayor Beougher also spoke on the Denton County bond for roads with Shiloh/McMakin on the list and perhaps Kings Road. Council Member Whisenhunt expressed he was not interested in putting Kings Road on the list.

8. Consideration and action on an ordinance of the Town of Double Oak amending the comprehensive zoning ordinance, plan and official zoning map for the Town by changing the zoning from Agriculture 1 (Ag-1) to Agriculture 2 (Ag-2) on a tract of land located at 5807 Pepperport Lane and described as block 3 (NE corner) of the North Shiloh Addition, Town of Double Oak, Denton County, Texas, and being more specifically described in Exhibit "A"; directing The Town Secretary to change the zoning map accordingly; providing a repealing clause; providing a savings clause; providing a severability clause; providing for a penalty of fine not to exceed the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for each offense; and, providing for an effective date.

One month overlap with current product will enable smooth transition without loss of data.

David Graham, 411 Simmons, voiced concerns about how some of the COVID money was used.

Mayor Pro-Tem Johnson wants an audit of the SLFRF expenditures and the towns attorney review. Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Schoenrade would like to have CARES report.

12. Discussion on the position of current Town Treasurer and the new Town Council prior to work on 2022-2023 budget process.

Discussion on the process of selecting a Town Treasurer in the past. Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Schoenrade would like this item on the next agenda for action.

Mike Donnelly, 302 E. Carruth, commented that the treasurer's position is not necessarily an agenda item and an ordinance to clean up the duties and responsibilities of the Town Treasurer.

13. Discussion on forming a committee to work on Double Oak's 50<sup>th</sup> birthday in 2024.

Deputy Mayor Pro-Tem Schoenrade voiced the significance of the towns 50<sup>th</sup> birthday and stated it is not too soon the form a planning committee for the event and suggested the committee be listed on the Council Liaison Appointments. Ms. Schoenrade also asked for advertising and solicitation of members.

14. Discussion on 2022-2023 fiscal year budget and tax rate.

Town Treasurer Billie Garrett projected a spreadsheet of the five-year budge comparisons with actuals.

This process will be ongoing through August.

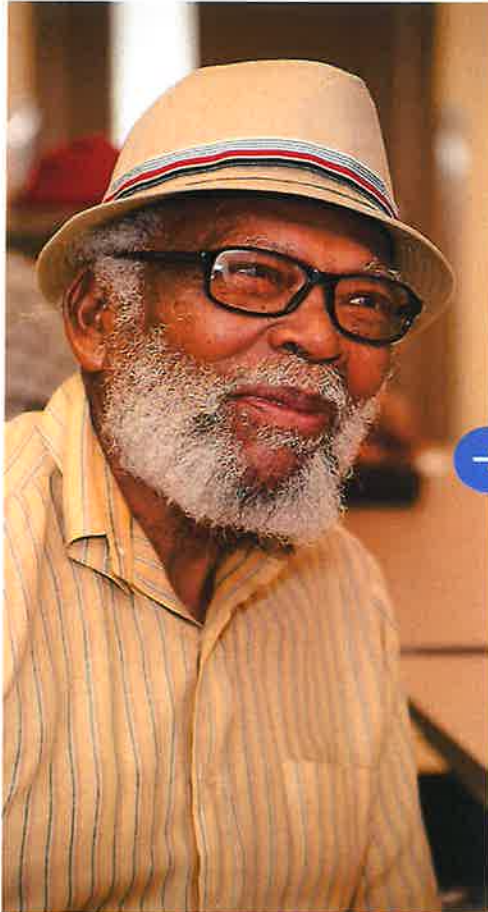

Last year, Meals on Wheels delivered over **109,000** meals to **1,095** clients throughout Denton County.

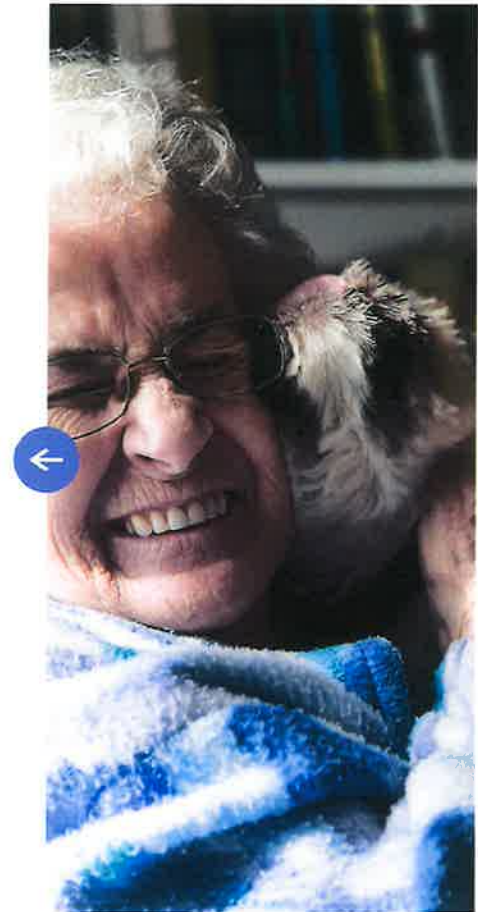

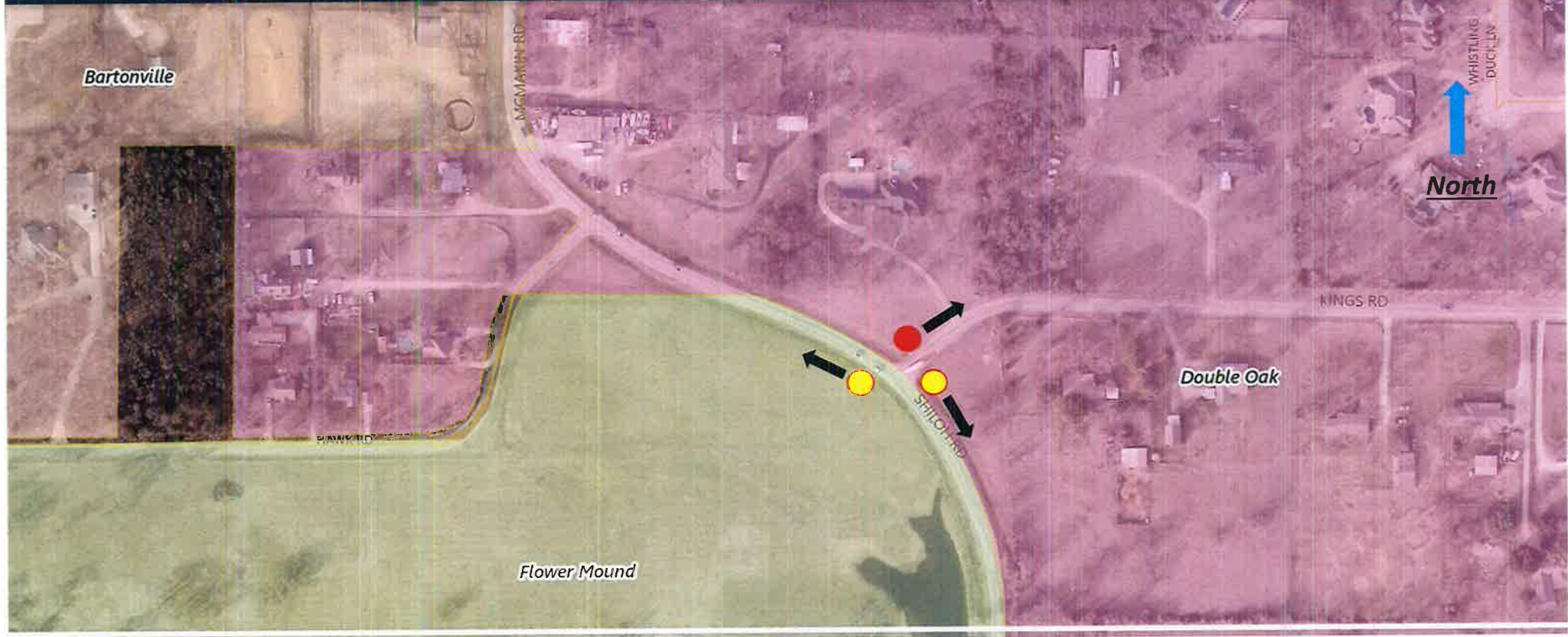

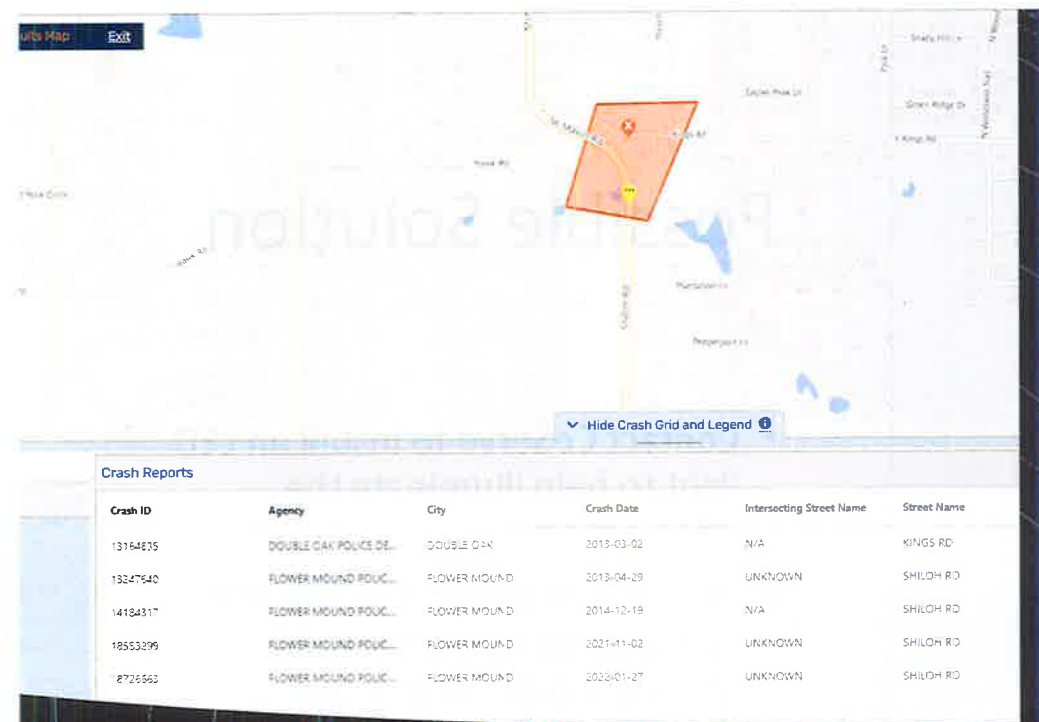
The LED's from the stop sign will affect the adjacent property owners due the amount of out put from the lighting.





## Possible Solution

- Contact CoServe to install an LED light to help illuminate the intersection.
- This in turn would only affect the intersection itself sense the lighting would be pointed downwards
- Install temporary flags at the top of each sign to draw attention to the stop signs



## Query Results Summary
